ASB 294 Medical Anthropology: Culture and Health:
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Course covers: The role of culture in health, illness and curing; health status, provider relations, and indigenous healing practices in US ethnic groups.

This course will address three major areas:

- 1) how culture plays a role in health and health behavior
- 2) health status and behavior in major US ethnic groups
- 3) anthropological approaches to understanding determinants of health

Assessment: Your grade will be based on three exams and 1 paper and associated requirements. Each exam is worth 25% of your final grade (total 75%). Your paper and associated requirements is worth 25% of your total grade.

the second one will cover Winkelman Chapter 6-10

Final exam will cover Purnell and Paulanka Chapters 1, 2, 3, 6, 9, 15, 17, 18 and 21

Extra Credit

A before and after self-assessment and write up of your cultural competency skills may be assessed for credit up to 1 grade level on your final grade. To access this option, you must

- 1) complete the self-assessment 1.4 during the first week of class and turn it in by 1/23; keep a copy for yourself.
- 2) do a second self-assessment and turn in on April 26; keep a copy for yourself
- 3) write up an assessment of the relationships between the two self assessments following these guidelines, and focusing upon your self-development in the stages N through I (see later handout). This is due May 2, along with the two assessments.

Extra Credit Write-up must address

- 1) What were your most significant cross-cultural learning experiences prior to this class?
- 2) Based upon your first self-assessment, what was your major level of intercultural competence exhibited in your responses, using Bennett's ethnorelative stages as a framework for self-assessment (N through I)? What about your developmental experiences contributed to this as your level of development?
- 3) What are the major influences on your intercultural development that occurred during this class?
- 4) What was your level of intercultural competency indicated by your second self-assessment? How does it relate to your first assessment?
- 5) Address why your level of intercultural development has changed or why it remained the same.
- 6) Are there specific items (questions on the self-assessment) that you did (or did not) change your mind about in terms of the self-assessment? Why?
- 7) What are the attitudes and behaviors that you need to change or develop to move to the next major level of intercultural development?
- 8) How do you feel that your intercultural attitudes and skills have changed (or not) across the course of this class, and why?
