Types of verbs:

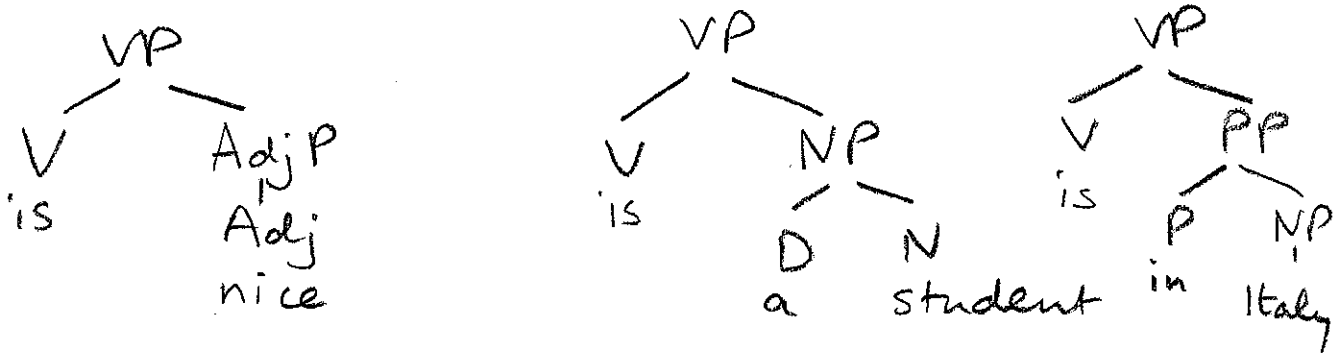
1. intransitive (no object)2. (mono)transitive (one direct object)3. ditransitive (one direct object and one indirect object)

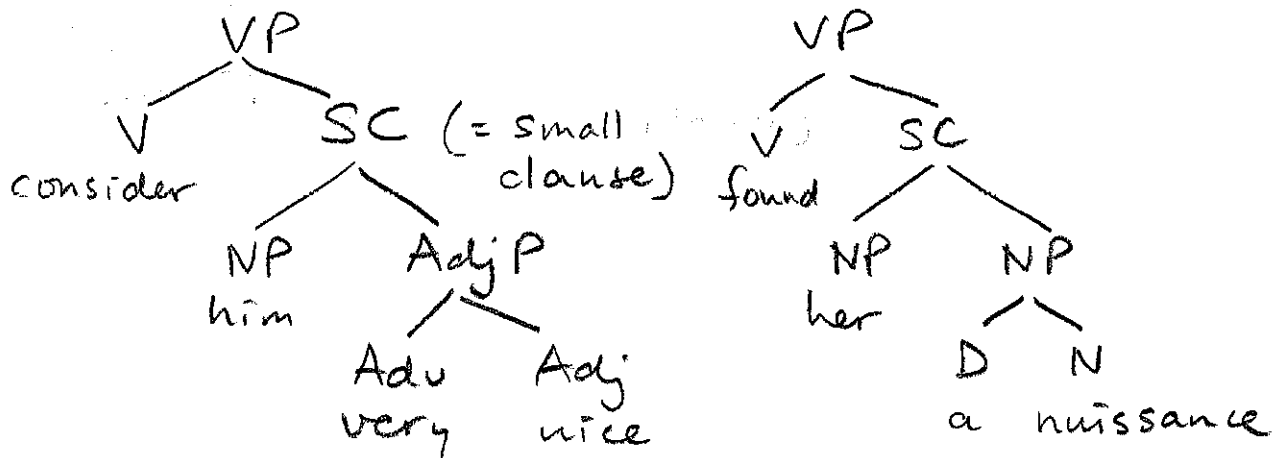

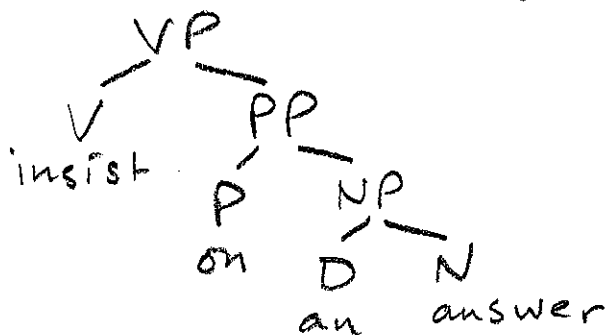
4. Copula (one subject predicate)
